Sports Premium Background Information

It is important that the grant is used effectively and based on school need. The <u>Education Inspection Framework</u> makes clear there will be a focus on 'whether leaders and those responsible for governors all understand their respective roles and perform these in a way that enhances the effectiveness of the school'.
